Record soccer turnout

Sewickley Area Soccer has begun its third spring season with over 500 players, the highest number in the short history of the association.

Beginning with 83 children on eight teams in the under-8 age group, there are 145 in the under 10 age group, 120 in the under 12 group, and 96 in the under 15 group.

It is normal for the numbers to taper off in the older age groups, due to the multitude of other teen age activities. But an increasing number of kids who played when they were younger, have chosen to stay with the sport.

After practicing their skills twice a week on most of the school fields, Sewickley YMCA, and the War Memorial Park Fields, the teams play intramurally on Sunday afternoons at Quaker Valley Senior High, Edgeworth Elementary, and Sewickley Academy.

New additions this season are a boys 16 and under team with 17 players, a 19 and under boys team with 15 players, and one under 19 girls team with about 25 players. For competition, these teams will play in the West Penn State Yough Soccer Association against teams from such areas as North Allegheny, Shaler, North Hills, and Fox Chapel.

The nine-game season started earlier and will also end earlier on May 20 to accommodate the Little League players who will start batting it up as the spring soccer season comes to a close.

As the player enrollment scores a record high, so too has the demand for coaches, assistant coaches, referees, and administrators. This season a total of 75 adults are volunteering their time to meet the wave of enthusiasm that has characterized this sport from its establishment by Leo Moss three years ago.

QV tables varsity status for soccer

A precedent-setting motion that would make interscholastic soccer the 19th varsity sport sponsored by the Quaker Valley School District was tabled by a 5-3 vote at the April 25 meeting of the district board of directors.

While the school now fields an extramural soccer program, director August W. Frisch moved to table director Shirley Barker's motion to field an interscholastic soccer team in the WPIAL for 1979.

The action came after a discussion involving about seven representatives of Sewickley Area Soccer along with players and parents of players participating in the extramural program. Mrs. Barker's motion set precedent because it marked the first time the board has ever discussed induction of a new athletic program, according to superintendent Dr. Leroy Kite.

Dr. Kite said the district has conducted preliminary work necessary to fielding a team, but Quaker Valley lacks adequate locker and field facilities required to support an interscholastic soccer program. Interscholastic soccer program.

in the fall, and Dr. Kite indicated that facilities at the junior and senior high schools are then in constant use by the football and girls' athletic programs.

While the Quaker Valley Little League's plan for the district's Bell Acres property includes possible construction of a soccer field, director Josephine Sybo said the board has to finish its discussions with the league about rights and responsibilities of the property. Until then, the league cannot construct anything on the site.

"One of the things we could do is dovetail our plans for soccer with that," Mrs. Barker said. Such construction still would not solve the lack of locker room facilities, Dr. Kite said.

Admitting reluctance to tell the story, board president Dr. Michael M. Zahorchak said the president of the Western Pennsylvania Umpires Association filed a complaint with the WPIAL after soccer players were in each area of the baseball outfield on April 7 while interscholastic baseball game is in progress. Dr.

QV board votes in soccer

Soccer became the 19th interscholastic varsity sport sponsored by the Quaker Valley School district when district's board of directors voted for its inclusion on May 30.

The move came about after the board voted to table the motion at its April 25 meeting, pending further study.

The second sentence of the the motion to include soccer for the 1979-80 school year stipulated that no other sports could be added to the existing athletic program without comparable elimination in the number now offered.

"We've put a lot of energy and thought into this," said director Shirley Barker, chairman of the Educational Services Committee. "We feel there's no real good time to add this to our program, taking into account the problems with facilities we discussed last month. If we waited until next year, we feel that we'd still have the same problems next year that we'd have this year," Mrs. Barker said.

Director David A. Nimick questioned the second part of the motion, asking if inclusion of perhaps, a girl's program duning a non-peak period of facility use would require elimination of some other program.

Superintendent Dr. Leroy Kite responded that the district has neither the place nor space for additional programs without eliminating something.

"We should read this as a limitation to expansion of the sports program without board approval," director August W. Frisch said. The board then voted for adding soccer to the school's athletic program by a 7-0 vote, with directors Malcolm Hay Jr. and Joseph Palmer absent.

The board also voted to accept with regret and appreciation for past services, the resignation of John W. Kriever as Quaker Valley's representative to the Western Hills Joint School Authority.

After accepting Krieyer's resignation, William Cammarata of Aleppo Township was appointed as a replacement to that authority.

Dr. Kite announced that an opening exists on the Quaker Valley Joint School Authority with the death of Glenfield representative Fred P. Alexander. With the impending move of John R. Simpson from Sewickley, an opening from that borough may develop in the near future, according to Dr. Kite.

During his administrator's report, Dr. Kite said the district is the subject of a Carnegie-Mellon University study to determine the infringement of federal regulations on school administrator's time. Board president Dr. Michael M. Zahorchak received borard direction to write legislators about such infringement.

Dr. Zahorchak announced that letters would also be sen to the parents of all graduating seniors receiving academic scholarships, commending them on their achievement.
