





Sewickley kicks soccer into public arena

Sewickley Rorough will hold public hearings on changing the use of the amer ice arena property on Chadalak Gireet to accomamodate an indoor soccer facility. At a meeting on May 17, council agreed unanimously to advertise the new use on the recommendation of the Sewickley Planning Commission.

The planners had met in special session, at 7 p.m., prior to the council meeting. Chris Wright, general manager of the Pittsburgh Spirit soccer team, and a principal in a new corporation that hopes to purchase the former arena, agreed to three stipulations imposed by the Planning Commission. The building will be closed from midnight to 7 a.m.; there will be outside

supervision when more than two teams are in play and the main entrance of the structure will be changed from Chadwick Street to the bridge side.

Planners, all of whom were present except Edwin H. Gott Jr., seemed satisfied that the required number of off-street parking spaces are available. Actually 91 are required; the proposers feel there are 98.

Wright was accompanied to both the planning meeting and the council's session by Denny Kohlmyer, in charge of youth development for the Spirit, and John Wilcher, of Mt. Lebanon, a regional leader of the sport. Wright also promised one of his staff will supervise litter and garbage which were problems during the ice arena days.

"This will not be an operation where a key is handed to someone and told to lock up when the game is over." the Spirit manager said. He opined that good management is the best way for a business to protect its investment

Although the facility will be open year round, with the Spirit team as the principal tenant, the most intense use will be in winter, from November through March.

Defore the final vote was taken, councilmember Marie Guy asked that Wright produce letters from the Spirit owner, Edward J. DeBartolo, as proof of his blessing. She also wanted a letter from the banking institution that will lend money for the new venture. Wright promised the letters

would arrive the next day. May 18. (A check with the Sewickley borough manager's office on May 19, confirmed that Wright had kept his word.)

Councilmember Roger Wright was concerned about street security at night. The former arena property is located in an R-2B zone surrounded by private homes. Many of the homes, he said, are occupied by elderly persons. The Spirit manager said his group has no plans to hire professional security guards, "We will not go outside our own organization. We feel our staff is adequate. If we are not good neighbors, it will hurt our organization."

Once the decision on the Spirit proposal was made. council took up other

business. Roger Wright gave a budget update based on the first third of the year. He nated that police protection costs are up and the budget is over the first third of 1981. Through April of 1981 police expenses totaled \$149,152; to date in 1982 they amount to \$160,789. "We are about \$11,000 over in police protection," said Wright. He attributes it to a clause in the new police contract that requires patrolmen to be paid sergeant's pay if they are

Council president Clinton L. Childs was satisfied with the budget to date. "We are about 35 percent of our budget in four months," he said. "That's not bad."

As was expected council voted to lower the business

privilege tax from 1.5 to one mill on retail sales, and from one to 3/4 mills on wholesale grees sales. The action was taken after several months of discussion, debate with visitors and after fulfilling public advertising requirements. The vote in favor was unanimous.

Council sent a contract to provide police services to the Borough of Osborne back to committee. The base figure to provide the service- \$22,181 for 12 months-was not questioned. However Roger Wright and Charles E. Thorne took excention to providing extra duty patrols for \$12.18 per hour. Manager Martin McDaniel was asked to determine the exact cost and Police Committee chairman

Cronin said there were 314 arrests in Sewickley in April and 130 complaints filed with police. The borough collected \$1994 from motor fines and received \$3,507 from cases tried before the district magistrate. Late payers of parking tickets yielded \$2,066 to borough coffers; coins collected in the meters totaled \$3,503.

Chief Walter Brannon said his department had set up the excessive speed preventor equipment twice on Beaver Street and three times on the Ohio River Boulevard

A contract covering engineering fees for improvements to the sewer system was awarded to Green Engineering, Inc., the low bidder. Total cost will be \$2,000 according to Manager McDaniel. On the vote, Farole, who heads the sewer committee, abstained because he is an employee of the Green firm. Marie Guy voted nay saying she preferred Chester Engineers on the basis of their past work.

The final list for street im-

provements has been drawn up and will be advertised for bids. The revised list includes work on Lake and Straight Streets. Improvements to Kramer Street have been delayed. Council decided to go out for bids on guardrails for Dickson Road rather than have the borough crew do the work.

Visitor Leroy Egan said he had been corresponding with council about alleged violations of zoning at the Sewickley Village Condominium site next door to his residence at 302 Beaver St.

Egan said he is not satisfied with Martin McDaniel's answers to his questions. He is particularly concerned that drainage problems may ensue from a mound of earth built up over the condo's underground garage. According to Egan the mound is five feet high and, therefore, cannot be construed as an underground structure.

Egan took exception to an engineering study by the borough being done by a firm whose owner has a property contiguous to the condominium site.

Councilmember Jean George was sympathetic about the vagueness of the present zoning "code on underground structures.

"Our zoning doesn't cover what has happened to you," she said. She promised that the new zoning ordinance, currently being written, will deal with the problem.

Mrs. George asked Manager McDaniel what is being done about the appearance of the Sewickley Theater exterior. McDaniel said the owner has asked for more time to comply with the request to fix the signs. (There is a borough ordinance which mandates that all signs be kept in good repair.)

McDaniel reported that one street sign mounted that very day, May 17, is larger than the sign ordinance permits. The business firm will be asked to conform to the permitted size, he said. Also, he reported that a garage addition on Henry Avenue had been constructed without a building permit. The owner has been requested to remove the addition.




