At present, soccer dominates the schedule at Although it's not quite the center, and according to assistant manager Colleen Kelley, there are near-

120 teams in various leagues at the center.

While most of the people come from the Sewickley and Moon Township areas, Kelley added that many people come to play from the North Hills. Same come from as far as West Virginia to get in on the action.

The leagues are broken into a number of age categories, Kelley explained. They begin at age 8-and-under and go up to 40-and-over.

The cost for a team to participate in a league is \$280, Kelley explained when that figure is broken down, the cost is not too great for an individual.

A team of 20 plays once a week for eight weeks in each session. She estimated it would cost an individual \$2 per game. She added some teams are sponsored by a business that picks up the cost.

The majority of the participants are adult men, but Kelley said she would like more women involved.

"I'd definitely like to see more women playing;" she said. There are is a women's league and there are co-ed teams.

The facility is also used by the Pittsburgh Spirit of the Major Indoor Soccer League for practice. They have been using the center since Oct. 1, 1982 and have played some exhibition games there.

Besides the competitive leagues, there is also an instructional league, Kelley said. The emphasis is placed on teaching correct fundamental soccer techniques.

Kevin Talpas, Joe Papalio and members of the Spirit help teach the instructional léague.

Summer soccer camps are also held at the center.

Right now, emphasis at the center is on soccer. General manager Al Meehan said, "We're further developing soccer skills in the Western Pennsylvania area."

But soccer isn't the only

thing at the center. Kelley said an aerobic program was started this fall and will continue.

Meehan said the center will begin to live up to its name by adding a complete fitness center in the new year. The plans are complete and it should be ready June 1, Meehan stated.



In addition, Klein and the co-author of the book sponsor soccer camps for players from seven years old through high school age. These "Keystone Soccer Kamps" have been held in Bethel Park, Quaker Valley, Peters. Township, St. Fidelis Seminary in Butler and at Westminster College.

## SA suffers first loss of season

Sewickley Academy's boy's soccer team had a tall order in taking on Western Pennsylvania's highly ranked teams last week. The Panthers tied Kiski, 2-2 on Wednesday and lost to North Allegheny, 2-1 on Saturday.

"These are the first two teams of real caliber we've played so far this year," said head coach Tom Fitzpatrick, "and I think we held our own."

Panthers' pattern of falling behind early continued. In both contests, they were shut out in the first half and found themselves trailing. The second half was a different story, however, as it has been all year. Sewickley outscored its opponents 3-1 and showed much improved play.

"I can't figure out this first half jinx," Fitzpatrick commented. "I tell the kids each game that we need 50 concentrate on starting fast, but we've been falling be hind at every opportunity."


